A+ Parenting: Back-to-School

Parents, kick off the school year the right way. Be involved and engaged in your child's education. This goes way beyond buying a backpack and some blank notebooks. There are some definite ways you can help your child be successful in school. They are:

- *Make contact with the teacher. Open up the lines of communication between the most influential adults in your child's life, you and the teacher.
- *Make it clear to your child that it is important to your family that effort is put into doing well in school.
- *Track your child's progress and ask questions of your child so that you know he/she is engaged in daily school activities.
- *Provide a quiet, interruption free space for kids to do their homework.
- *Make sure your child isn't doing anything else, but homework. Multitasking just doesn't work.
- *Keep plenty of reading material in the house and make sure your children see you reading for work and for pleasure.

Kids who thrive in school have parents who support their achievement in every way possible.

New Absentee Policy

Excused Absences

a. The district recognizes that student absences are sometimes necessary. Please note that even though a student's absence may be excused, it will still affect the student's education. Every effort should be made by the students and parents to minimize the number of excused absences. The school retains the right to determine which absences are considered excused and unexcused.

III. Excessive Absences

a. It is the belief of the New Hampton Community School District that an absence from school, whether excused or unexcused, is a day of lost instructional time.

b. When a student misses 4 days in a semester, the counselor will meet with the student to ascertain the reasons for the absences and contact the parents to stress the importance of regular attendance.

c. When a student misses 6 days in a semester, the principal will contact the parents to discuss the reasons for the absences and to discuss the importance of regular attendance and the possible consequences of not improving it.

d. When a student misses 8 days in a semester, a letter will be sent to the parents informing them of the status of their child and that the situation will be turned over to the county attorney if two more absences occur in the semester. e. When a student misses the 10th day in a semester, a letter will be sent to the parent and the matter will be turned over to the county attorney for further review. f. The administration reserves the right to consider each situation individually and make exceptions as the situation warrants. For example, if a student is hospitalized or a serious family emergency arises.

Thank you for your patience during our first eRegistration process!

Please call the school before 9:00 a.m. (394-5858) to inform us when your child is going to miss a day of school. We ask that you also share the reason for the absence. This applies to TLC fours, TK, and Kindergarten as well as grades 1 – 4.

*Make sure that your child and your child's teacher know when there is a change in how he/she will get home from school. Being left at the door without knowing who is coming or how to get home is extremely stressful for a child.

* Please go into PowerSchool and update any information on your child as change occurs so everything is current.

Reminders from the Elementary Office

Here are a few reminders as we begin the first semester:

- *The school doors are locked throughout the day for the safety and security of your child. We do not want to meet an adult in the hallway that is not wearing a visitor's badge. If you are entering the building during the daytime, come into the elementary office and sign in.
- * School attendance is essential for success in school. Please schedule medical appointments outside of school time, whenever possible.
- *If your child is ill, please call the office (394-5858) before 9:00 on that morning to inform us. Make arrangements to pick up his/her homework later that day, if possible.
- * Please be advised that you may request information on the qualifications of our staff at anytime.
- * You are welcome to visit the school and classrooms. Let your child's teacher know if you are interested in visiting or helping out in the classroom.
- * The NHE Handbook states that no invitations to a child's birthday party will be handled through the classroom. Be advised that due to the privacy laws of both the federal and state government, we are not allowed to pass out the names or any other information concerning students in a classroom.
- *Just a reminder that bus students are dismissed at 3:20 and town people are dismissed at 3:25.


