iJAG serves students through partnerships with schools, employers, community organizations, and legislative groups to create successful, synergistic impacts on lowa's young people, workforce and economy.

iJAG's innovative and evolving curriculum integrates the JAG program model with learner-centered strategies to deliver solutions that are evidence-based and results-driven. Instruction is paired with civic involvement, employer services, leadership opportunities plus local and statewide events that help students develop soft skills and professional readiness.

The annual iJAG Leadership Development Conference (LDC) includes student leaders that are hand-selected to participate in breakout sessions, workshops and hands-on training. Activities strengthen support for the iJAG kid and equip students to make an impact on their peers, in their schools and within their communities.

Legislative Days are held frequently throughout the year so lowa legislators can hear directly from iJAG students about how programming and curriculum impacts their lives and plans for the future. Over 200 students met with legislators, where they engaged in the civic process of lifting their voices in support of iJAG.



The Career Development Conference (CDC) is a year-end celebration for all iJAG programs to network, attend employer-led workshops, participate in a career fair plus compete in competition categories. Competitions challenge students in areas related to decision-making, financial literacy, public speaking, business plan writing and more. In 2023, IJAG hosted more than 600 students to mark this as the largest iJAG event in history.



The National Career Development Conference (NCDC) features top student competitors from 39 state JAG programs. In 2023, 21 Iowa students attended as state competitors or representatives of our State Career Association. iJAG earned thirdplace nationally in the Lift Our Voices for Equality Project competition while lowa students Kira Canada and Charlie Garcia were honored for their service on the National Career Association (NCA) leadership team. Kira was officially inducted as President of the NCA for the next term.

iJAG introduced four new Student Career Association Association (SCA) officers at this years' CDC in support of its ongoing mission to elevate student voices, create advocacy and leadership opportunities and promote our programs statewide.





BUILDING THE FUTURE

This spring iJAG launched its first year-long fundraising initiative for individual donors called **For the Future!** Since April, iJAG has raised \$80,000 in support of this goal. Laurie Phelan, our founder, is the honorary chair for this initiative.



Furthermore, iJAG has a unique private-sector fundraising strategy that raises over 2 million dollars through business donors and community grants. Our strategy is to increase to 3.5 million dollars this year to work towards a 50/50 cost share of private and public dollars. This initiative will continue to allow iJAG to innovate programming to address evolving needs, wants, and barriers of its students - all while remaining learner-centered and JAG-aligned.
